Pastor Ken's Corner

Joel 2:12-17 (NRSV)

¹² Yet even now, says the LORD, return to me with all your heart, with fasting, with weeping, and with mourning; ¹³ rend your hearts and not your clothing. Return to the LORD, your God, for he is gracious and merciful, slow to anger, and abounding in steadfast love, and relents from punishing. ¹⁴ Who knows whether he will not turn and relent, and leave a blessing behind him, a grain offering and a drink offering for the LORD, your God? ¹⁵ Blow the trumpet in Zion; sanctify a fast; call a solemn assembly; ¹⁶ gather the people. Sanctify the congregation; assemble the aged; gather the children, even infants at the breast. Let the bridegroom leave his room, and the bride her canopy. ¹⁷ Between the vestibule and the altar let the priests, the ministers of the LORD, weep. Let them say, "Spare your people, O LORD, and do not make your heritage a mockery, a byword among the nations. Why should it be said among the peoples, 'Where is their God?'''

We enter another season in which to focus on God's grace and mercy. We have the joy of Easter and its promise, but we must or should pass through the reflection and meditation of **Lent** (**Ash Wednesday..**.February 14 to April 1...**Easter**) to fully appreciate God's love, mercy and grace...by **fasting** and **praying** and **meditating** on the scriptures, particularly ones from the prophets such as Joel, so that we can gain an inkling into Jesus Christ's sacrifice for us.

We come to the period of Lent which brings us ultimately to the celebration of Easter. But, **we aren't there yet**... just as we await the return of Jesus and the new heaven and the new earth promised and foretold in John's Revelation. Just as we went through Advent to prepare us for Jesus' birth so we go through Lent to prepare our hearts and souls for his resurrection...at Easter.

¹² Yet even now, says the LORD, return to me with all your heart, with fasting, with weeping, and with mourning; ¹³ rend your hearts and not your clothing. Return to the LORD, your God, for he is gracious and merciful, slow to anger, and abounding in steadfast love, and relents from punishing. Lent is the time for us to return to the Lord with all our heart... yes, through fasting and meditating and reading the Word to draw nearer to our Lord.

Saturday, February 3, we have our Mobile Food Pantry with the Cryer Center from 9 to 11 a.m. Zoar Baptist is the lead for this weekend. All are welcome to come and help or just to see what goes on for this event if you haven't been here for a while. We will continue the warming tree and coat closet for another month; anyone wanting to help can contact Warren or Kathy Wright.

Our Lenten Bible Study will begin on Wednesday, February 21, at 7 p.m. with sessions continuing through March 21. The five-session study is by Max Lucado and is entitled *He Chose the Nails*. There are still books available and joining the study at any point can benefit you. The cost for the book is \$11; sign up in the social hall or see Warren Wright.

Most of all, as we are in the season of Lent where we prepare ourselves for Easter, I pray for deep reflection, fasting and meditation which leads to waking on that Easter Morn.

Lent is a time for all of us to gather and present ourselves for the Lord to sanctify us by the Holy Spirit.


Let us all be in an attitude of gratitude in our daily prayers and our daily meditations and readings and all our interactions with our brothers and sisters.

A Message from Your Lay Leader What's this thing that we call Tithing/Stewardship? Can you actually balance a church budget? By Warren Wright

A well-worn dollar bill and a similarly distressed twenty dollar bill arrive at the Federal Reserve Bank to be retired. As they move along the conveyer belt to be burned, they strike up a conversation. The twenty reminisces about its travels all over the country. "I've had a pretty good life," it proclaims. "Why I've been to Las Vegas and Atlantic City, performances on Broadway, the best restaurants in New York, even a cruise to the Caribbean." "Wow!" exclaims the one dollar bill. "You've really had an exciting life!" "So tell me," says the twenty, "where have you been throughout your lifetime?' The one dollar bill replies, "Oh I've been to the Christian Church, the Methodist Church, the Baptist Church…" "**Tell me," the twenty dollar bill interrupts, "what's a church?"**

So why is money such a touchy topic in churches today anyway? Some people think the church is only out to get their money. "I'm not going to that church, all they ever do is ask for money. Sure they quote scripture and say it's better to give than to receive. Seems to me they are all about receiving." Have you ever heard that before? Just as it is a sensitive issue today, so it was in Jesus' time. That didn't stop Jesus from talking about it though. Did you know that more than half of Jesus' parables relate to tithing/stewardship? There are 2,350 passages in the Bible dealing with money and material possessions - more than on any other subject - but it's the least talked about subject in the church. One out of every six verses in Matthew, Mark, and Luke deals with money. I get the impression God wants us to deal with this issue regularly. Throughout the Old Testament tithing/stewardship is described as giving the very best of the first of everything in our lives – our thoughts, our hearts, our families, our possessions, our money – nothing is to be held back from God. The New Testament scriptures refer to giving it all to God. Not just the first 10 percent, all of it. "And God can give you more blessings than you need. Then you will always have plenty of everything - enough to give to every good work." Don't you just love God's straightforwardness? He sure doesn't pull any punches. God gives so we can give. It's that created in His image thing you know. My favorite author, Max Lucado, put it this way, "You don't give for God's sake. You give for your sake. The purpose of tithing/stewardship is to teach you to always put God first in your lives". At Clarksbury UMC, we have struggled for years to meet our budget (and a very tight budget to say the least), but in 2017 because of some very generous givers who opened their wallets wider, we were able to meet our budget for the first time in years. Wouldn't it be nice if we didn't have to worry about meeting our budget? What if I told you that there is a way to avoid the end of the year budget woes by simply increasing your giving by \$1.00-\$2.00-\$3.00-\$4.00-\$5.00 per week. Our Financial Secretary has distributed 45 "Giving Envelopes" for 2018 to members of the church and you will be surprised at how much just an extra dollar a week placed in those envelopes will affect the budget, look at these examples:

\$1.00 per week x 45 x 52=\$2,340.00 per year \$2.00 per week x 45 x 52=\$4,680.00 per year \$3.00 per week x 45 x 52=\$7,020.00 per year \$4.00 per week x 45 x 52=\$9,360.00 per year \$5.00 per week x 45 x 52=\$11,700.00 per year

As your Lay Leader, I ask you to search your heart this year and consider that extra dollar or dollars each week.

Matthew 6:19-21 "Do not store up for yourselves treasures on earth, where moth and rest destroy, and where thieves break in and steal. But store up for yourselves treasures in heaven. Where moth and rust do not destroy, and where thieves do not break in and steal. For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also."

A Short Primer on Nursing Home Ministry THE WORD						
Matt. 5:37-40 Then the righteous will answer him, saying, "Lord, when did we see you hungry and feed you, or thirsty						

when did we see you hungry and feed you, or thirsty and give you a drink? And when did we see you a stranger and welcome you, or naked and clothe you? And when did we see you sick or in prison and visit you? And the King will answer them,

"Truly, I say you, as you did it to one of the least of these my brothers, you did it to me. (ESV) The Field For many underlying reasons, some good and some not so good, our modern Western Civilization has organized itself in such a way as to create an institutionalized population in our midst. This division of our culture is composed of people who receive life sustaining care on a long-term basis (thus, "long term care" or LTC"). In using the terms "nursing home ministry" or "care center ministry" we refer to a broad category of long-term care settings which include retirement homes, assisted living facilities, and nursing homes.

The population of a local care facility will often accurately reflect the ethnic, religious and cultural diversity of the community that surrounds it. Therefore, of particular importance to the Christian volunteer, he or she must be prepared to accommodate an interdenominational group of believers to whom they will be expected to minister. Of course, people living in long-term care would be typically older and more mentally and/or physically infirm than the general population. This being said, the Christian volunteer should also be aware that there is a trend, especially in nursing homes, toward a growing contingent of middle-aged and young adult residents.
