John 12:20-33 (NRSV)

²³ Jesus answered them, "The hour has come for the Son of Man to be glorified. ²⁴ Very truly, I tell you, unless a grain of wheat falls into the earth and dies, it remains just a single grain; but if it dies, it bears much fruit. ²⁵ Those who love their life lose it, and those who hate their life in this world will keep it for eternal life. ²⁶ Whoever serves me must follow me, and where I am, there will my servant be also. Whoever serves me, the Father will honor. ²⁷ "Now my soul is troubled. And what should I say—'Father, save me from this hour'? No, it is for this reason that I have come to this hour. ²⁸ Father, glorify your name." Then a voice came from heaven, "I have glorified it, and I will glorify it again." ²⁹ The crowd standing there heard it and said that it was thunder. Others said, "An angel has spoken to him." ³⁰ Jesus answered, "This voice has come for your sake, not for mine. ³¹ Now is the judgment of this world; now the ruler of this world will be driven out. ³² And I, when I am lifted up from the earth, will draw all people to myself." ³³ He said this to indicate the kind of death he was to die.

The season of Lent began on Ash Wednesday, February 14, and will conclude on March 31, the day before Easter. We often associate Lent with self-reflection, repentance, prayer, fasting and self-denial...a spiritual cleaning, of sorts. Perhaps you've heard or asked, "What did you give up for Lent?"

When we choose willingly to give something up—a habit, an indulgence or a behavior—we do so intentionally to avail ourselves of God's grace. This self-denial leads to a dying of self as we anticipate and expect that we will experience, through our Easter faith, a rising with Christ and a rebirth of life.

Lent is a season of preparation and anticipation. Let us prepare for and anticipate the sadness and grief that we feel when Christ is laid in the tomb. Let us, then, look with new eyes toward Easter as we celebrate and give thanks that we are a Resurrection people.

My prayer is that WE continue to pray, meditate on His WORD daily, serve our community selflessly, and celebrate those sheep who have lost their way (like you and I have at different times) when they are found and returned to the fold.

We, together, have pledged OUR prayers, OUR presence, OUR gifts, OUR service and OUR witness for Christ and His Church.



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A Message from Your Lay Leader Saint Patrick, The Shamrock, The Trinity By Warren Wright



Little is known of Saint Patrick's early life, though it is known that he was born in Roman Britain (part of the island of Great Britain) in the 4th century, into a wealthy family. His father and grandfather were Deacons in the Church. At the age of sixteen, he was kidnapped by Irish raiders and taken captive to Ireland as a slave. It is believed he was held somewhere on the west coast of Ireland, possibly Mayo, but the exact location is unknown. According to his Confession, he was told by God in a dream to flee from captivity to the coast, where he would board a ship and return to Britain. Upon returning, he quickly joined the Church in Auxerre in Gaul and studied to be a priest.

In 432, he again said that he was called back to Ireland, though as a bishop, to Christianize the Irish from their native polytheism. Irish folklore tells that one of his teaching methods included using the Shamrock to explain the Christian doctrine of the Trinity to the Irish people. Originally, the color associated with Saint Patrick was blue. Over the years the color green and its association with Saint Patrick's Day grew. Green ribbons and Shamrocks were worn in celebration of St Patrick's Day as early as the 17th century. In the 1798 rebellion, in hopes of making a political statement, Irish soldiers wore full green uniforms on March 17th in hopes of catching public attention. The phrase "the wearing of the green", meaning to wear a shamrock on one's clothing, derives from a song of the same name. After nearly thirty years of Evangelism, he died on 17 March 461, and according to tradition, was buried at Downpatrick. Although there were other more successful missions to Ireland from Rome, Patrick endured as the principal champion of Irish Christianity and is held in esteem in the Irish Church.

Matthew 28:18-20-"And Jesus came up and spoke to them, saying, 'All authority has been given to Me in heaven and on earth. go therefore and make disciples of all the nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father *and* the Son *and* the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I commanded you, and lo, I am with you always, even to the end of the age.'"

Fill your mind with what is good and pleasing and holy (Philippians 4:8). It doesn't have to be labeled "Christian" in order to be uplifting and edifying—but you do need to guard your mind and heart against temptations because there is no one else who will do this for you. As you build relationships with others, you will find opportunities to share what God is doing in your life. And as you see more of Him, your faith will deepen, and you'll find yourself worshipping God more and more often! Yes, he works that way.

The truth is we can find God in movies, books, and activities if we set our mind on Him and remember to watch for Him. Each of us has to decide what to feed ourselves to bring out the best in ourselves, and then to turn it around to offer it to God.

We have a human tendency to compartmentalize—this box is for church, and that one is for the other parts of life. Make a conscious effort to keep the boxes wide open and allow them to overflow into other areas. Be open about how you see God in your life. Simply live it, authentically. Let your life be your worship. Offer it as a gift to the God who has given you so much. That's the most powerful kind of testimony, and the most beautiful kind of worship—whether you're in church or not.





Forty Incredible Fabulous Days Of Wonder

Acts 1:1-3

1I wrote about all that Jesus did and taught from the beginning 2until the day when he was taken up to heaven, after giving instructions through the Holy Spirit to the Apostles whom He had chosen. 3After His suffering He presented Himself alive to them by many convincing proofs, appearing to them during forty days and speaking about the kingdom of God. (NRSV)

On April 9, AD30, followers of the Nazarene, Jesus, had just witnessed the most inconceivably horrible day of their lives. As they walked along, most likely in silence, asking why this could happen.

Wasn't He the Savior, the one promised us to break us out of bondage? He told us this would happen. We all knew what was going to happen. We knew He was doing this to save our souls, but were we ready for it? No, no, no, we were not ready, it just can't be.

They had gathered in a second-story room in Jerusalem. This was their third day of mourning. It was illegal to mourn publically for a condemned criminal. Their teacher, whom they had believed to be the long-expected **Messiah** sent to rescue Israel from bondage, was dead. They'd watched Him die. The depression in the room was so thick you could almost cut it with a knife.

SUDDENLY the door flew open. Women, breathless from running from the tomb where they were going to prepare the body of Jesus in the Jewish tradition. They were babbling confusing things about a rolling stone,

(Matthew 28:2, a missing corpse, John 20:2-13, angels, Luke 24:4-5, and a risen Christ. Matthew: 28:8-10)!!!

That was the start of the most amazing days of their lives.

Jesus spoke of things pertaining to the kingdom of God. (Acts 1:3). Alive and kicking, Jesus appeared to His people in all kinds of places and situations. He spoke their names, touched them, invited them to touch Him, ate with them hiked and fished with them. The scars of the crucifixion were visible in His hands and feet and side. (Luke 24:39-40, John 20:27).

People crowded around their **Master** in those meetings after He had arisen. They probably sat on the edge of their seats, unable to take their eyes off the back-from-the-dead Jesus. "The Kingdom of God" had always been on His mind. He spoke of it more than eighty times in the **four Gospels.** Alive from the dead, He talked about it more than ever.

The Kingdom seems to center in one major issue. In the Lord's Prayer Jesus taught us to pray: "Our Father in heaven, hallowed be Your name. Your kingdom come. Your will be done on earth

as it is in heaven. (Matthew 6:9-10). The Kingdom is the reign or rule of God. Everything in the kingdom focuses on doing **God's will**.

Are our churches putting some "oomph" behind those thoughts and prayers? Are we active in the needs of our different communities?

But at the same time, maybe we aren't putting enough "oomph" into our thoughts and prayers. I mean, how sore are your praying knees? When you say you will pray for someone, what does that mean to you? A short prayer and then out of sight, out of mind?

I'm guilty of this as well, Many times, I have apologized to people because all I can offer are my thoughts and prayers in a certain situation. But just as I am trying to break a cycle of apologizing when either I'm not actually sorry or I shouldn't be apologizing, maybe this phrase can also be saved from the brink (there's a great Dove commercial on this, if you haven't seen it).

If you often offer your "thoughts and prayers," are you following these words up with action? If you are tired of the phrase, how much time and effort are you putting into your prayer life?
