A Message from Your Lay Leader What God really means to our American Heritage By Warren Wright

In my Grapevine article next month, I will be reporting to you on the UMC annual conference in Hampton. So I wanted you to have something for July 4th this month. The 4th of July is a special day in our country but not just for the signing of the Declaration of Independence. Many special things have happened on this day.

Three American presidents died on the Fourth of July, John Adams, Thomas Jefferson, and James Monroe. And if you want to get down to it, Monroe was ready to die several days before but doctors kept him alive with drugs just long enough so that he could die on the fourth of July. Why did they do that? Because the fourth of July meant something. Calvin Coolidge was born on that day in 1872. West Point opened, July 4th 1802. Stephen Foster was born on July 4th.

The song "America" was sung for the first time on July 4th, 1832 in Boston. Alaska and Hawaii both became states on the fourth of July. Slavery was abolished in the state of New York on July the fourth 1845. And in that great document delivered on July the 4th, 1776, we read of a belief that all people have rights given by the creator of Mankind. The document only has 1321 words, it takes just eight minutes to read, and God is mentioned four times, twice at the beginning and twice at the end. And the purpose of the declaration was to separate us officially from the repression and authority of England. And the very act of signing the declaration said to the world that I am a traitor to my native country of England. I am a criminal, a fugitive from London's Justice.

Who were the men who were willing to sign? Of the 56 men who signed it two were twenty years of age, sixteen were in their thirties, twenty in their forties, eleven in their fifties, six in their sixties, and one, Benjamin Franklin, over 70.

All but two were married. Each had an average of 6 children. 24 were lawyers, 9 were merchants, 14 were farmers, 4 were doctors, and one was a preacher.

We're not talking about low life, drifters, and rebels. We're talking about educated, civilized men who were willing to sacrifice everything for a cause that they believed in. And history shows us that they paid the price for that bravery.

John Adams said, "The general principles on which the Fathers achieved independence were the general principles of Christianity." Adams went on to say that in observing the 4th of July, "It ought to be commemorated as the day of deliverance by solemn acts of devotion to God Almighty."

And the trouble with America today, is that we stopped listening to our fathers, listening to what they told us God did in their lives long ago.

Psalm 44:1, says "We have heard with our ears Oh God, Our fathers have told us what you did in their day long ago."


Just ask Terry as she is a regular on these trips and the bus ride is FUN as well as shopping. Please THINK about this as this is a new month and they will be going again. See you there.

JUNE POP! (POWER OF PRAYER!)

I have had recent experiences that most people would consider to be catastrophic, but have actually been filled with praise to our Lord.

My only child had a stroke on March 4. On March 5, I fell and broke my ankle in four places, also dislocating it so my foot was 90 degrees from the rest of my leg.

My first answers to prayer came while I was laying on the ground, waiting for the ambulance. I prayed to God to help me deal with the pain and take away my fear. My husband can verify the fact that I did not utter a sound. I was calm, quiet, and peaceful. Next, as a former driver in the MCVRS, I prayed for the crew that answered my call. The crew that came to my aid were professional, competent, and very gentle in their treatment of me. Other members of the rescue squad and even members of the fire department came to offer lifting assistance. From this point on until today, I have more of God's messengers than I can name. However, part of the wonderful crew that took me to the hospital was one of our church members, Eileen Crittenden. As a paramedic, she gave me pain medication before we got underway. My crew says that I was the happiest patient they have ever taken to the hospital.

The next day, I had surgery performed by Dr. Perez. I prayed for a Christian surgeon. I got a Christian surgeon who did an excellent job. My scars are arrow straight. Ken and Terry stayed with Johnny in the waiting room for a long time. I was the last patient of the day. Again, my prayers were abundantly answered.

If I name everyone who has touched and impacted my life, this will be the longest article that has ever been in the Grapevine. Isn't that a tremendous blessing? One of the highlights has been the love shown by my husband, Johnny. He spent the nights with me while I was in the hospital. After my move to rehab, he was there faithfully every day. He brought me everything I asked for and did everything he could to make me comfortable. He also had a tremendous amount of help from his brother, Larry and an extended family member, Alice Dix. They have all remained very supportive and do everything they can to help me get well.

The folks at the rehab center, Heron Cove, were all very kind and helpful. Some of them even prayed with me if I was having a rough night. My therapists equipped me with exercises I am faithfully completing each day to help hasten my healing.

The EMTs on my rescue squad crew, Sandy and Frank Murphy, bought a hospital bed from the Cryer Center and met Johnny at home to help him set it up. When I got back home, members of the squad were there to offer help getting me in the house and everything was all set up and ready for me. I had no worries! Again, my prayers were answered in a powerful way.

I always knew I had good friends, but my friends have helped feed my son's dog, cleaned my house, brought food and plants, watered my plants, and done everything they could to make me comfortable and know that I am loved.

Also, I realized that there is a blessing in the fact that I am injured. Had I not been hurt, I would have tried to care for my son on my own when he was released from the hospital. This stroke was extensive enough that he has needed help of a more professional level than I can reasonably provide. Therefore, he has received better care as a result of my injury. God is always working, although we don't always understand the "how."

Lastly, what a tremendous blessing our beautiful church family has been. With your cards, visits, reading material, presents, meals and phone calls, you have answered my prayers before I even had time to utter them.

From my recent experiences, I hope I have learned to trust God more and question Him less. My belief in the fantastic power of prayer to bring hope and healing has been greatly reinforced. God continues to strengthen me through the power of prayer. Just this week, my son, Beck, actually made a joke. That is a sign that his brain is finally beginning to heal. Praise God!
