

I used to type over sixty words per minute, but those days are long gone. The contents of this biography are based on a few facts, some un-asked-for reminders, the confusion of dates and times, and a declining memory. The writer should not be held accountable for mis-information and incorrect facts due to senility, attention deficit disorder, and very old age.)

May 24th, 1940, was a painful day for my mother, an anxious day for my father, and a happy day for my aunt. Mother was giving birth to me, Dad was en-route from Washington, DC, by train, and Aunt Louise was happy to have a child to baby.

My first years were spent in Richmond's Church Hill, and at six months, I became a member of the Cradle Roll of Leigh Street Baptist Church, the "Big Church on the Hill, with a Gospel Message and a Friendly Spirit." I grew up there, singing in the choir, becoming involved in administrative responsibilities, and serving as the Treasurer of the Sunday school. In my teens, I was offered a



scholarship if I would go into ministry, but that was not on my agenda at that time – I was more interested in playing in dance bands and chasing pretty girls, although not necessarily in that order. From the time I was eight years old, I worked outside the home: delivering groceries at the local grocery store, carrying newspapers, and as a grocery clerk after school and all day Saturday. With these financial rewards, I bought my own clothing, purchased my first car, and paid my way to college. After completing two years of higher education, I ran out of money, and decided to go into the sales field.

Perhaps I should mention that I met the true love of my life in 1975, and asked her out to dinner. Maybe I should have mentioned it earlier. Sue Ann turned me down, flat. She was the most beautiful woman I had ever met. For years, I continued to patronize the drug store where she worked as a Pharmacist. At least I was persistent! We finally started dating in 1980, and married in 1981. On August 19th, we celebrated our 37th wedding anniversary.

I would be remiss if I did not mention my Aunt Louise, my Mother's twin sister, who lived on the old home place in Caroline County, where I live now. I stayed with her whenever possible. I even raised my own tobacco, getting \$32.00 per hundred pounds, an astonishing amount for a young boy. I purchased the farm from her in 1983. Sue Ann and I lived in a small trailer until we had tried rural living for a while, and then built our home there in the mid- eighties. I love sitting in our sunroom and looking out over the fields of corn or soybeans, and appreciating all the animals around us. After trying several sales and marketing jobs, I settled on the lawn and garden industry, working as a marketing representative for three different corporations over a decade and a half. When Sue Ann and I married, I realized that I would prefer staying at home every night instead of traveling around the Eastern seaboard. With my contacts, and the knowledge gained over the years from my service in the industry, I started my own landscape company: Hickory Hill Landscaping. I was rewarded in this endeavor but another calling came to me.

When we moved to the farm, Sue Ann insisted that we start going to church. I suggested the Baptist church several miles away. She replied that she was born a Methodist, baptized a Methodist, raised as a Methodist, and that we would attend the Methodist Church up the road. I soon became a member of Shiloh UMC, on the Bowling Green Charge of the Ashland District. Sue Ann insisted that we take part in a bible study at another church, called The Disciple Bible Study. I highly recommend it to anyone wishing to explore the Bible and your own call to ministry. At that time, I was not too thrilled with a Monday night event because it interfered with my Monday night football. At that time, I really liked football. About the same time frame, I also became involved with Lay Speaking Ministries, speaking in a number of churches around the district and serving as the Lay Leader for a three point charge, attending all three churches with the pastor, and assisting him in all the services. When he became ill, I served the churches for almost six months. Between this commitment and the Disciple Bible Study, I made the decision to become a licensed minister in the United Methodist Church, also known as a Local Pastor.

In May of 1995 I attended Local Pastor's Licensing School, and in July was appointed to my first church. They are listed chronologically: Grace Church Hartwood, Lancaster Charge (White Marsh & Irvington) Lancaster County, Central Mathews, Montross Charge (Grant, Providence & Lebanon) Westmoreland County

I also attended Wesley Theological Seminary and Duke Divinity School to fulfill the licensing requirement of the church.

My retirement was at the end of the church year in June, 2007. A month prior to that date, on May 31st, I had by-pass surgery. I got my last month off with pay. Don't let anybody fool you, a six way by-pass takes a long, long time to get over.

In December of that same year, I was asked by the district superintendent to preach for a couple of Sundays at a church in Middlesex County: Clarksbury. I accepted the call, and thoroughly enjoyed both the congregation and the choir. Later, in 2008, the superintendent called me back, asking if I would assume the responsibilities of serving as pastor of Clarksbury until the end of the church year – the last Sunday of June. My affirmative answer put me back in the pulpit – a decision that I never regretted. To this day, the good people of Clarksbury continue to remember me and bless me with cards and letters and phone-calls on my birthday and holidays, plus weekly bulletins, and a monthly newsletter. I have never been treated so wonderfully.

In July of 2008, I accepted an appointment to Rehoboth UMC in Lancaster County. I served there for two years as sacrament minister, preaching on the first Sunday, and serving Holy Communion. Sue Ann and I were then transferred to the Staunton district, were Sue Ann served Parish Court UMC. After a year, I accepted another part-time appointment to Allegheny UMC, just a few steps from West Virginia. After two more years, we asked for a transfer, and Sue Ann was appointed to the Gordonsville charge in the Charlottesville District. With declining health, I did not seek another appointment. After two more years, Sue Ann finally retired, and we moved back to our home at Hickory Hill Farm in Caroline County.

During my entire ministry, I regularly supported Henderson Settlement, an Outreach Ministry of The United Methodist Church in Frakes, Kentucky. I served on the Board of Directors for six years, commuting to Eastern Kentucky four to six times a year. That organization reaches out to the poor and homeless, plus it offers support to every age group, from newborns to seniors needing daycare. I also bought a church. Three years after White Marsh UMC in Lancaster County was closed by the Virginia Conference, I called a group of like-minded people together and I negotiated the sale of the church for a dollar, and formed Historic White Marsh Church, Inc., which I served as pastor and founding director for five years. Again, declining health and old age forced my retirement. White Marsh is still serving the community as a place of worship and a meeting center.

That completes my bio – golly, it is more than I thought it would be. I pray the readers are not too bored with my senile ramblings. If someone wishes to add or subtract something, have at it. God bless, Pastor Jim
