We are treated as impostors, and yet are true; ⁹ as unknown, and yet are well known; as dying, and see—we are alive; as punished, and yet not killed; ¹⁰ as sorrowful, yet always rejoicing; as poor, yet making many rich; as having nothing, and yet possessing everything.

We come to a time in the life of our Christian church year where we consider meditatively and prayerfully our relationship with our Creator and our brothers and sisters.

LENT which starts on Ash Wednesday, March 6, is much more than just a time to receive a mark of the cross on our foreheads and much more than just a time when we give up something in an effort to appear penitent and reflective and pious.

Clarksbury's Ash Wednesday service will be at noon on March 6. Later that same day at 6 p.m. there will be a service for prayer and meditation and **imposition of ashes**.

LENT can be a time when we look to where we are in our lives today and **ONLY IMAGINE** what our lives will be like when we are in the presence of our Creator, our Savior and the Holy Spirit.

LENT should be a time when we look at our lives and take stock of what our priorities are and focus on the life we are living.

²⁰ So we are ambassadors for Christ, since God is making his appeal through us; we entreat you on behalf of Christ, be reconciled to God.

LENT could be the time for us to repent of the wrong direction in which we've been headed in our lives and to **ASK for forgiveness with contrite hearts** and to **accept in faith** the blessings of God's mercy and grace.

God has already done all that needs to be done for our **RECONCILIATION to GOD**. We can then step out with confidence on the path that Christ lays out for us...the WAY, the TRUTH and the LIFE...His way!!!

This **LENT**, some Christians are still facing persecution, life threatening persecution, and we are called to remain faithful and persevere throughout by the power of the Lord through His strength no matter the consequences.

Our Lenten Bible Study ***Who is this Man?*** (a five-session study by John Ortberg) starts on Thursday, March 14, at 2 p.m. ***Who Is This Man?*** illustrates how Jesus' influence has swept over history, bringing his inspiration to the evolution of art, science, government, medicine, and education and how his vision for us to lead lives of dignity, compassion, forgiveness, and hope continues to inspire and challenge humanity today. A sign-up sheet is on the table in the social hall and the cost of a book is \$12.

We will be distributing food on Saturday, March 2, in partnership with the Cryer Center through their Mobile Food Pantry. Our Warming Tree and Coat Closet ministries will be open on Saturday at the same time as the food pantry so there will be plenty of work for all of those who show up from 9-11 a.m. These ministries will be providing people with gloves, hats, mufflers and scarves as well as coats, jackets and sweaters. Philippi Church of Christ has the lead in our three-church rotation. With weather anticipated to be cold, we need to be mindful of layering clothing and limiting the amount of time our workers and those we serve will be outside. With this in mind it will be a good thing to have more people come and share in the labor so we can rotate more people outside for less individual exposure to the elements.

A topic still on most minds is the Called General Conference Session on February 23-26, 2019, in St. Louis. The reports of the decisions reached by the delegation and the impacts on our Connectional Church will be coming out shortly. Be in prayer for all those connected with this Session to be in the spirit throughout the conference. Wherever or however the “Way Forward” plays out next year for the United Methodist connection, we Christians, yes us, will still have the same commandment from Jesus to love one another as He has loved us and to go into all the world and preach the Gospel of Jesus Christ! Our prime directive, as it were, is still the same.

A Message from Your Lay Leader

Saint Patrick, The Shamrock, The Trinity

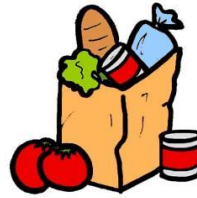


Little is known of Saint Patrick's early life, though it is known that he was born in Roman Britain (part of the island of Great Britain) in the 4th century, into a wealthy family. His father and grandfather were Deacons in the Church. At the age of sixteen, he was kidnapped by Irish raiders and taken captive to Ireland as a slave. It is believed he was held somewhere on the west coast of Ireland, possibly Mayo; but the exact location is unknown. According to his Confession, he was told by God in a dream to flee from captivity to the coast, where he would board a ship and return to Britain. Upon returning, he quickly joined the Church in Auxerre in Gaul and studied to be a priest.

In 432, he again said that he was called back to Ireland, though as a bishop, to Christianize the Irish from their native polytheism. Irish folklore tells that one of his teaching methods included using the Shamrock to explain the Christian doctrine of the Trinity to the Irish people. Originally, the color associated with Saint Patrick was blue. Over the years the color green and its association with Saint Patrick's Day grew. Green ribbons and Shamrocks were worn in celebration of St Patrick's Day as early as the 17th century. In the 1798 rebellion, in hopes of making a political statement, Irish soldiers wore full green uniforms on March 17th in hopes of catching public attention. The phrase "the wearing of the green", meaning to wear a shamrock on one's clothing, derives from a song of the same name. After nearly thirty years of Evangelism, he died on 17 March 461, and according to tradition, was buried at Downpatrick. Although there were other more successful missions to Ireland from Rome, Patrick endured as the principal champion of Irish Christianity and is held in esteem in the Irish Church.

Matthew 28:18-20-"And Jesus came up and spoke to them, saying, 'All authority has been given to Me in heaven and on earth. go therefore and make disciples of all the nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father *and* the Son *and* the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I commanded you, and lo, I am with you always, even to the end of the age.'"

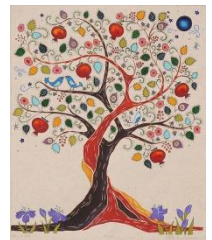

The Youth Music Class meets with Becky Wilhite during the Sunday School hour each week to develop their musical skills in a nurturing Christian environment. Skills include singing and playing instruments while allowing each young person to contribute to the group effort of using music to the glory of God. Informally making music together in a non-judgmental environment has helped them to have confidence to perform occasionally for the morning worship service. Some share their singing talents while others play percussion instruments, choir chimes, acoustic and electric guitar, flute, saxophone, and horn. Also, learning basic piano when attendance is low has provided an opportunity for some of the youth to learn to read music and understand scales and chords since some of them have had more formal music instruction than others. Each week together is different, and the music often leads to discussions and prayers in a small group where the students can open up to each other and build relationships. The time together is tailored to meet their musical and spiritual needs as they mature, and hopefully, it provides one hour of their week where they are allowed to grow in whatever way they need at that specific time.

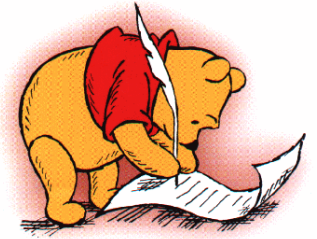

Through a lot of trial and error in my thinking, and classes by those more learned than I, and lots of study, it seems the following is what my current feelings are of the things that make me feel that I am helping those that need.



- I want to help others and recognize the gift I bring with my **presence**.
- Being present to another sometimes **is a difficult task**.
- Learning to be **with the person**, rather than try to solve the problem. I can't solve it, but I do hope that my presence helps.
- Understanding others is enough. It is truly “standing under,” and uplifting of them is the goal.
- Being present is not the same as being nice to the them. Being nice is a form of discounting the other, of not taking seriously the irritating and demanding behavior that masks his/her pain.
- Allow them to have pain. **Learn to enter into it rather than try to take it away.**
- It is important to learn to not hear just the content of their message, but also the feelings and emotions about the content.
- When I feel lost in an interaction, I ask myself, “What is this person trying to reveal to me? What is the meaning or purpose of his/ her communication with me?”
- When we are aware of our own feelings we can **respond** to others **rather than react** to them. Reacting means meeting the other's feeling with your feelings. Responding means meeting his/her feelings with understanding.
- Learning to hear and not become part of the conflict by taking sides.
- To minimize their feelings about their life is to discount the other. **False cheering up is a form of discounting.** The person may feel obligated to feel happier for your sake. The meeting of our own need creates an illusion of well- being.

It is hard, but very much doable if this is your calling. Only you and God know if

if it is your calling. But no matter what, any of you can make their day with just a

visit to any one of the residents. Remember, you're getting old too.
