Pastor Ken's Corner

Ephesians 5:15-20 (NRSV)

- 15 Be careful then how you live, not as unwise people but as wise,
- 16 making the most of the time, because the days are evil.
- ¹⁷ So do not be foolish, but understand what the will of the Lord is.
- ¹⁸ Do not get drunk with wine, for that is debauchery; but be filled with the Spirit,
- ¹⁹ as you sing psalms and hymns and spiritual songs among yourselves, singing and making melody to the Lord in your hearts, ²⁰ giving thanks to God the Father at all times and for everything in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ.

Praise the Lord!! Doesn't it feel great to be in church together? Let us celebrate the new freedoms and yet keep in mind that the threat is not eliminated, merely diminished. For some, the risks of COVID are very real and very present. We lift up in our prayers those who are at risk and still under many restrictions.

Our PRG is working on proposing a plan to the District Superintendent for review that is based on our LOCAL conditions. The Church Council has replaced the HCT in Phase 3 of our Post-COVID Re-entry Group (PRG). The PRG put in place the following modifications to our in-person services.

These steps are:

- 1. Fully vaccinated leaders may preach without a mask.
- 2. Fully vaccinated persons may be unmasked in indoor and outdoor settings.
- 3. Fully vaccinated persons may sing without a mask in indoor and outdoor settings.
- 4. Eating outdoors may occur with individually packed meals.
- 5. We will resume our social time in the social hall after Church using prepackaged snacks.
- 6. Additionally, the PRG determined that we will resume our normal method of receiving offerings and also we will resume receiving communion (pre-packaged elements) at the rail during our communion services.

We will continue to look at other services and worship here at Clarksbury with an eye toward not just returning to the old normal but to improving our outreach and worship opportunities. We will get used to these new plans and will adapt for our local context and continue to be safe. We will continue with our in-person services and will continue to video and post on Facebook.

How very relevant these words are for the climate and circumstances of our time. Are we doing all we can to be as wise and discerning as Jesus wants us to be, and are we doing all we can to understand what the will of God is?

18 Do not get drunk with wine, for that is debauchery; but be filled with the Spirit, 19 as you sing psalms and hymns and spiritual songs among yourselves, singing and making melody to the Lord in your hearts, 20 giving thanks to God the Father at all times and for everything in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ.

We need to be making prudent and sober judgments for our lives and for those for whom we are responsible. We need to be filled with the Spirit, the Holy Spirit, as we sing and worship and lift joyful noises to our Lord with our whole hearts.

We must give thanks to the Father at all times for everything in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ...even when times are difficult, and we don't understand why bad things happen to good people and good things happen to bad people. He even goes so far as to make known to us the mystery of His intention to bring us all to Himself...all of us, everything in heaven and on earth.

In Jesus we see and hear the word of truth and the good news of our salvation, and in our belief and FAITH in Jesus we are marked by the seal of the Holy Spirit. Our names are written in the Book of Life and we will dwell with Him forevermore.

Today we can draw comfort from how nurturing and caring God the Father is...how He seeks out ALL of us and wants us to be with HIM in His kingdom.

We continue to acknowledge the generosity and efforts of our **Soup**Ministry/Prayer Warriors/Prayer Partners each month. They provide meals, soup, gifts, cards, letters and phone calls to many of our members as well as those at Fishing Bay Estates and other locations.

Keep the small groups and gatherings in your prayers as we look to new ways to restart these meaningful and joyful worship and sharing opportunities.

Jerry does a great job with cards and letters, and the Prayer Partners and Prayer Warriors are great avenues for continuing and strengthening our relationships. We need to continue these efforts!

Let us continue to pray for the people who may encounter COVID-19 and be exposed to or suffer from the illness. Many of us have gotten the vaccines or are scheduled to receive them.

Be ready for changes in how we follow the regulations and live into the new opportunities we have to serve and worship safely, spiritually and meaningfully in our local context.

A Note from your Lay Leader UNITED METHODIST SPIRITUALITY AND THEOLOGY SPIRITUAL PRINCIPLES: THE GENERAL RULES

book of theology and order, The United Methodist Discipline:

The "General Rules" of United Methodist Christians includes three basic principles which guide our practice of the spiritual life. John Wesley first proposed these in the mid-1700s as he began a number of small group meetings (called classes or societies) to encourage, spiritually develop and support his new Methodists. The



First: by doing no harm: avoiding evil of every kind, especially that which is most generally practiced; such as...taking of the name of God in vain...profaning of the day of the Lord...Drunkenness...Slaveholding...Fighting, quarreling, brawling, returning evil for evil. Uncharitable or unprofitable conversation. Doing to others as we would not they should do unto us.

three principles, each with some detailed instructions, are condensed and paraphrased here from our

Second, by doing good: by being in every kind merciful after (our) power; as (we) have opportunity, doing good of every possible sort, and as for as possible to all: to their bodies by giving food to the hungry, clothing to the naked, by visiting or helping them that are sick or in prison... to their souls, by instructing, reproving or exhorting all we (converse) with... to fellow Christians by the means we have available.

Doing what we know is not for the glory of God. Softness and needless self-indulgence.

Third, by using the means of grace: public worship, listening to the Scriptures read, receiving the Lord's Supper, family and private prayer, searching the Scriptures (in private study), and Fasting or Abstinence.

United Methodists encourage spiritual growth. Wesley taught that Christian spirituality should include "the means of grace" or "works of piety". The means of grace included:

Centering in Prayer: Wesley encouraged daily private devotion, usually in both the morning and evening, as well as time for family or household devotions. He suggested that these prayers should include expressing: (1) love and gratitude to God, (2) regret for our failures to love and serve others, (3) telling our thoughts, feelings and requests to God, (4) intercessions for others' needs, and (5) simply listening for what God might want to say to guide or correct us.

Searching the Scriptures: Wesley encouraged daily reading of the Scriptures. He suggested that we read the Bible seriously (with prayer), systematically (reading entire books or through the Bible), carefully (with good commentaries and scholarship), and fruitfully (immediately putting into practice

what we learn). We are also urged to meditate on what we read and to take every opportunity we can find to hear the Bible read by others in worship or small groups. Wesley asked Christians to always keep a Bible with them so they could read whenever they had time available.

Conferring with Others: Methodists welcome the opportunity to "confer" or converse individually and in small groups in order to encourage one another in the spiritual life, and to help each one to be accountable for responsible discipleship.

Worship and the Lord's Supper: Methodist Christians are encouraged to worship often, at least weekly, and to share in the Lord's Supper or Communion as often as possible, as a means of union with Christ and with other Christians.

Fasting: It's not a discipline that is familiar or popular these days, but in Wesley's era his Methodists were instructed to fast a day or so every week. The motives included: self-denial (how many of us could use a little humility today?), voluntary simplicity, giving our surplus of food or money to the needs of the poor, and as a measure for good health.

Matthew 18:19-20-"Again | say to you, that if two of you agree on earth about anything that they may ask, it shall be done for them by My Father who is in heaven. "For where two or three have gathered together in My name, | am there in their midst."

Why You Should Not Be Timid in Your Prayers



(Guideposts) Bob Hostetler How to Pray, Jun 29, 2021

We can learn a lot about life, faith and prayer from the heroes and anti-heroes of the Bible.

One of my favorite accounts involves the patriarch Abraham when three mysterious visitors arrived at his tent "near the great trees of Mamre"

(Genesis 18:1, NIV). After revealing to Abraham and his wife, Sarah, that she would soon bring a son into the world, two of the visitors journeyed on to Sodom. The one who lingered revealed to Abraham that the wicked cities of Sodom and Gomorrah were scheduled for divine judgment.

Abraham, apparently suspecting or recognizing his visitor as the Lord, began to plead: "What if there are 50 righteous people in the city? Will you really sweep it away and not spare the place for the sake of the 50 righteous people in it?" (Genesis 18:24, NIV)

The Lord agreed to spare the city for the sake of 50 righteous people. Abraham pressed the matter like the Middle Eastern merchant he was: What about 45? 40? 30? 20? 10? The Lord agreed, "For the sake of 10, I will not destroy it" (Genesis 18:32, NIV).

It's a striking, memorable scene that corresponds nicely with Jesus' teaching about perseverance—even audacity—in prayer (see Luke 11:5-8), Abraham's negotiations with God may embolden us to be persistent in our own prayers. But I think there's more in that Genesis 18 account than may first appear. Because, after interceding for Sodom with such boldness and tenacity, Abraham apparently stopped asking at the number 10. But there weren't 10 righteous people in Sodom. Only Abraham's nephew, Lot, his wife, and two daughters were given an angelic escort out of the doomed city.

Might things have been different if Abraham had kept asking? If he had continued pressing his appeal to, say, five? Or even one? If he had not stopped asking until God stopped granting?

We don't know. But when Jesus taught on the subject of prayer, telling a story of someone knocking on a friend's door at midnight, pleading for bread, He applied His teaching: "So I say to you, ask and keep on asking, and it will be given to you" (Luke 11:9, Amplified Bible).

Years later, James, the brother of Jesus, wrote to early Jewish Christians, saying, "You do not have because you do not ask" (James 4:2, NASB). So, one thing we might learn from Abraham, Jesus and James, is to be persistent, bold—even *greedy*—in prayer. To "pray and not give up" (Luke 18:1 NIV). To not be timid. To not confine ourselves to small requests. And to not cease from asking until our pleas are granted. To ask...and to keep asking, and asking, and asking...and "it will be given t you."
